Visit to Stansted Airport College

On Wednesday, twelve Year 11 pupils visited Stansted Airport College. These pupils expressed an interest in applying for one of their three courses in Aviation Operations, Engineering & Aircraft Management or Events Management.

Our pupils were truly inspired with the state-of-the-art facilities, sponsored by various airlines. These included a private jet donated to the College. Pupils were able to climb aboard and explore the premium seating as well as sit in the cockpit.

Later, pupils dismantled and repaired aircraft parts, as well sat in a classroom, designed like a plane, allowing pupils to practise serving passengers as well as perform on board safety demonstrations.

The College has a 98% success rate of pupils graduating and landing jobs in the aviation sector. Combined with an assembly earlier this term, both experiences demonstrated the potential of post-16 providers. Our careers team is committed to promoting inclusive opportunities and encouraging pupils to consider all of their potential options.

Supporting children watching and browsing online

According to Ofcom, the online safety regulator, a significant majority of children are watching online videos regularly. and browsing the internet. This represents over 90% of children. Explore the hub to get help on the best ways to navigate parental controls, set healthy screen time habits, and encourage safe, age-appropriate online activities.

What are AI tools and AI generated content?

Al generated content: This is where an image, video or voice recording has been created using an online generator. These can be completely artificial, meaning none of the content is real, or they can be altered versions of existing real content.

Al content generators: These are the tools used to create Al generated content by entering a series of commands to generate new content or edit an existing image or video.

Al chat bots: These are chat functions where you are speaking with a bot rather than a real person. They will often only respond to short messages and will usually introduce themselves as a bot. However, the bots can often be given human names.

Al summaries: This is where a platform gathers and summarises information, usually found at the top of a page or search engine result. The Al will often take information from across a range of sources and list the sources within the summary.

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Witnessing domestic abuse is child abuse

Domestic abuse can have a devastating impact on the victims and their families, with children and young people at risk of serious harm to both their emotional and physical health.

How are children affected by domestic abuse?

Children who witness domestic abuse are at risk of both short and long-term physical and mental health problems. Every child will be affected differently to the trauma of domestic abuse.

Short-term effects of domestic abuse:

For school aged children this can include:

- A loss of drive to participate in activities and school.
- Lower grades in school.
- Feeling guilty and to blame for the abuse happening to them.
- Getting into trouble more often.
- Physical signs such as headaches and stomach aches.

For teenagers this can include:

- Acting out in negative ways such as missing school or fighting with family members.
- Having low self-esteem.
- Finding it difficult to make friends.
- Engaging in risky behaviours such as using alcohol and other drugs.

. Long-term effects of domestic abuse:

- Mental health problems, such as becoming anxious or depressed. Low mental health can also lead to big
 impacts on physical health, including self-harm or developing an eating disorder.
- Having a lowered sense of self-worth.
- Using alcohol and other drugs as unhealthy coping mechanisms.
- Repeating behaviours seen in their domestic setting.
