The Picture of Dorian Gray: Oscar Wilde - Paper 2 Prose

Read in depth, analyse and respond to 19th century prose. The novel and its contemporary context: aestheticism, fin de siècle, Victorian Gothic, Darwinism and societal responses Wilde as an author, his life and influences on his work Wilde's use of recurring motifs, setting, symbolism and allusion How Wilde uses language and structure to develop character and explore central themes: gender, class, love and relationships influence and corruption, reputation, duality and deception, morality. Employ relevant terminology and develop close detailed analysis of writer's methods and language features.

The Little Stranger: Sarah Waters - Paper 2 Prose

Read in depth, analyse and respond to modern 21st Century prose. The novel and its contexts: post-war Britain and the welfare state; declining gentry and the aristocracy; postmodernism and generic conventions

Waters' use of the Gothic, recurring motifs, setting, symbolism, unreliable narrator

How Waters uses language and structure to develop character and explore central themes: gender, class, love and relationships, influence and corruption, reputation, duality and deception, morality Employ relevant terminology and develop close detailed analysis of writer's methods and language features.

Use emagazine and British Library resources to enrich cultural capital and contextual understandings as well as different interpretations of the text.


Make links between and comparing the texts, focusing on methods, structures, themes and ideas as well as differing contexts.

Poems of the Decade - Paper 3 Poetry

Explore how poets create meaning through language and structure in a range of 21st century poems and apply what's learnt in comparison with unprepared poetry. Poetic method: register, imagery, symbolism and connotation; structural elements and motifs; prosody, lineation and sound; intertextuality.

Othello: William Shakespeare - Paper 1 Drama

Read in depth, analyse and respond to Shakespearean tragic drama.

The play in performance

Tragedy: Aristotle, Bradley

Shakespeare's use of recurring motifs, setting, symbolism,

allusion, verse, prose

Responses to character and situation

How Shakespeare uses language and structure to develop character and explore central themes: gender; race; sex and love; reputation and honour; jealousy/ human nature; disguise and deception

Employ the AQA Critical Anthology, emagazine and other critical perspectives/ interpretations across time in written and spoken analysis; Explore critical perspectives such as feminist, New Historicist, psychoanalytical and Marxist.

The play in its contemporary context: Venice, race, gender, European politics

The play and its sources: Cinthio

Analyse dramatic interpretations on film and stage.

Assessment: In-class timed assessment and yr 12 PPE Paper 1

A Streetcar Named Desire: Tennessee Williams - Paper 1 <u>Drama</u>

Read in depth, analyse and respond to modern tragic drama The play in performance and film.

Tragedy: Aristotle, Bradley; modern tragedy

Williams's use of recurring motifs, symbolism, Expressionistic staging, dialogue and varying registers

Responses to and readings of character and situation How Williams uses setting, language, allusion and structure to develop character and explore central themes: gender masculinity and femininity; social change; sex, sexuality and love; dreams and reality; human mortality

Employ emagazine articles and other critical perspectives/interpretations to inform written and spoken analysis.

Explore critical perspectives such as feminist, psychoanalytical and Marxist.

The play in its contemporary context: the Southern Gothic, post-War America; the lost Ante-Bellum; the American Dream; immigration and race in 20th century America; gender politics of mid-20th century America; Williams's own life

Analyse interpretations on film and stage.

Assessment: In-class timed assessments and yr 12 PPE Paper 2

Throughout both years 12 and 13

Read two literary texts in depth and respond by comparing their treatment of a chosen theme or critical perspective.

Read and employ a range of critical material to inform the analysis of the chosen texts.

Consider closely the significance contexts of production and reception of the chosen texts in relation to the central theme/ perspective.

Explore and convey how writers employ language, structure, symbolism, intertextuality and allusion to create meaning and explore the central theme.

Compare how the chosen texts employ the above Independently plan, draft and write an extended response (3000 words) to the chosen texts, theme or critical perspective, editing as appropriate.

Prepare footnotes and a bibliography.
