# Jack Petchey "Speak Out" Challenge

This week, 30 Year 10 students took part in the Jack Petchey "Speak Out" challenge. This was a fantastic opportunity for students to develop their public speaking, listening, deliberation and feedback skills.

The full day workshop was led by an expert Speakers Trust trainer who facilitated inspirational speaking activities for our students. They were also offered insights into overcoming nerves, learning how to listen effectively as well as working together to give positive and constructive feedback to each other.

Students learnt top tips for speaking in public before they were given time to use all these skills to build their own speech from scratch. By this point every student had been provided with several opportunities to speak in front of their peer group.

By the end of the workshop, every student had given a 90 second speech without notes on a topic they are passionate about. Speech topics ranged from 'paper straws' to 'autism' and left the judges, Miss Casey, Mr Dearmer and Mr Smyrk, extremely impressed.

Our four semi-finalists, Sally Hoghton, Ethan Jolly, Jess Reeves, and Taylor Lovegrove, will battle it out in a Year 8 Speak Out Assembly for a place in the regional final.

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## 9 to 5 Upper School Production


