## YEAR 9 STUDENT JUDE STALLARD COLLECTING GOLD!



During our excursion, the Year 12 and Year 13 art and photography students visited the Musée d'Orsay, Centre Pompidou, Musée d'Orangerie and the Louvre. Traversing the Métro was almost as complicated as finding our way through the Louvre (and excellent work to Rachel, our navigator). Although beautifully painted with vibrant hues and sfumto, Leonardo's famous smoke effect, the Mona Lisa was a little smaller than expected

but certainly did not disappoint. The Venus de Milo inspired several of our art students to sketch, but that was halted due to the typical Louvre crowds blocking the statue, much to the chagrin of Nathan, Issy and Victor.



Manet's Olympia was a thrill to see in the flesh (literally!), and the modernist artwork at the Pompidou gained some new Brentwood fans. Giacometti, du Champ, and Matisse captured our students' attention as did actress Natalie Portman creating sandcastles on the second floor. Aside from a sneaky sighting of actor Johnny Depp (or was it?), the view of the Eiffel Tower was certainly as demanding as the view from the top of the Tower. Our boat cruise down the Seine also proved to be very entertaining: wonderful views of Notre Dame, the lock bridge, as well as an impromptu dance contest. Some fell in love with Paris' beige beauty, while others just fell for the Parisians. #### **U16 NETBALL**

The St Martin's School U16 Netball Team progressed to the regional round of this year's National Schools Competition held at Hassenbrook School, Stanford-le-Hope in January. Having being crowned Mid-Essex Champions back in November the girls went on to test themselves against the very best schools in Essex at the County round of the competition beating all bar one of their opposition to make qualification.

The action set off at a frenetic pace in the first game of the day against Stanway School (Colchester). Blustery conditions made it difficult for the girls but Saints were able to hold their nerve resulting in an 8-7 win. With the first victory under their belts the team's confidence grew. Tough opposition meant shooters Hannah Scully, Roxy Brown and Tia Stack had to be on form and they netted accurately all through the morning. Rebecca Dyball and Charlotte Jones were dominant in defence and the girls went on to win four more group matches. They beat Woodlands School (Basildon) 8-3, Helena Romanes (Dunmow) 15-1, Greensward Academy (Hockley) 9-3 and Chelmsford County High School for Girls 6-3. A narrow loss to King John School, (Benfleet) in the last group game meant the Hutton school girls went through to the knock-out stage as runners-up facing local rivals Brentwood School who Saints had already beaten in the Mid Essex qualifying round.

The semi-final was exciting and closely contested throughout; Rosie Andrews proved pivotal in the centre court linking well with her wings Tonie Abbott and Olivia Spink with Saints finishing eventual winners.

The final saw St Martin's face King John once again who, in their semi-final play off, had beaten previous

National Finalists Fitzwimarc School (Rayleigh) 10-8. Safe in the knowledge that as finalists they would both qualify to the Regional round the girls all seemed to relax and produced an outstanding display of high class netball with King John ending the tournament as winners 6-5.

Head of Girls' PE, Mrs Swan said "Our girls have worked exceptionally hard as a team in training to improve their match play and tactical awareness since September. They were really excited to be one of the two teams representing Essex at the Regional Finals and I am exceptionally proud of their achievement."



The students' behaviour was excellent throughout the trip and a credit to the school and to their families, it was an absolute pleasure for me to lead the trip.


