St Martin's School was lucky enough to secure the maximum five places and visited University College London on Thursday 19 June. The day included:


- Taster lectures and seminars designed to catch the interest of high achieving Year 9 students and show what university level study involves.



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FRENCH EXCHANGE WITH COLLÈGE ROGER VERCEL, DINAN



This year, a French exchange was established between St Martin's School and Collège Roger Vercel in Dinan, Brittany. In March, the French students came to Hutton with Madame Duclos and Monsieur Troubadours and stayed with their partner or host families for a week during which time, they visited many places in London and also spent a day at school with our students in lessons and playing sport.

In May, twenty Year 8 and 9 students from St Martin's travelled to Dinan with Mrs Scott Rous and Mrs Ballard by Eurostar and TGV high speed train across France. The week in Dinan was jam-packed with visits and activities. We visited the D-Day landing beach museum at Utah Beach as well as the American Second World War cemetery shortly before Barack Obama went there for the 70th anniversary of the D-Day landings. The day also included the Bayeux Tapestry.

Other trips were to Mont St Michel where we visited the island and church before taking shoes and socks off to explore the bay at low tide and see traditional fishing with fish traps. In St Malo, after a visit to a pirate house, we had a picnic overlooking the sea and the students enjoyed that favourite pastime, shopping! One morning was spent at Collège Roger Vercel and our students experienced what it is like to attend a small and very old French school which used to



be a convent, quite a contrast to

St Martin's. The afternoon was spent visiting food shops in Dinan where we tasted cheese and chocolate and saw bread being baked.

The exchange was much more than a tourist trip to France. The students also experienced French school and family life.

In the evenings, although they were sometimes outside their comfort zone, they coped fantastically with the challenges of communicating no doubt helped by the warm welcome given by the French families. They returned to Hutton with more French and a greater knowledge of France but more importantly, they had become more mature and independent and had shown that they could not only survive but actually have a great time with another family. YEAR 12 SWISS PROJECT 2014

Seventeen Year 12 students spent a week in Basel, Switzerland in mid June on the second leg of the annual partnership project with Gymnasium Baumlihof, accompanied by Mr Stock and Mrs Mercer. This is the fourth year that we have made this visit and the project is going from strength to strength, with this being the largest group yet. The students were mostly hosted by the families of the exchange students who visited Brentwood in January, and it was great to see them all again. Many good friendships have been made and several people are planning to go back to Basel privately.

The Swiss school day is very different from ours, with the first lesson at 7:40 and the last ones going on well into the afternoon. The students and teachers only have to be present when they have lessons, so the school days feel very different. As well as visiting normal lessons, the group had a series of German language lessons, where they learned how to make basic conversation (many are not 'A' Level linguists but managed very well), and there was also a lesson on Swiss Geography. We made a visit to the global headquarters of Novartis, the pharmaceuticals multinational, to see their stateof-the-art research campus and found out about the industry's role in the Swiss economy. There was a second leg of the town trail to be done, this was started in Colchester in January which included completing joint research projects. We held an Anglo-Swiss international beach volleyball competition one afternoon, which the Swiss narrowly won (well, we did win the indoor cricket in January...)



The highlight for many people was the trip to central Switzerland on the last day by train, post bus, cable car and lake paddle steamer. We did a two-hour hike about 6000 feet up in the mountains and then had a traditional Swiss campfire lunch, before heading for a couple of hours sightseeing in Luzern.

We were unfortunately delayed by a few hours on our way home, thanks to a broken-down aircraft, but this did not dent what was a really superb week. Judging by the tired-looking eyes, the evening social life was pretty good too...

Chloe's performance impressed the coaches and as a result of this Chloe has been selected as a reserve for the National Track and Field Championships in Birmingham in July.

Chloe's next achievement was competing in the Race for Life at Garons Park, Southend, which had 3000 women competing she finished an incredible 4th with a time of 22 minutes and 32 seconds. Chloe raised over \pounds 1,500 for charity and was inspired by her grandad.

But Chloe's most recent success was only one she could dream of after receiving the fantastic news that she had been selected for the Fort Boyard Ultimate Challenge. Chloe, aged 15, found out about the challenge through her trampolining club when an email was received asking for contestants aged 12-18. From the 250 applications only 80 would be considered; 40 contestants were selected from Essex and 40 from Birmingham. Chloe along with her fellow competitors took part in a gruelling challenge at the Stubbers Adventure Centre in Upminster. This included high ropes, raft building and interviews in between each activity. Chloe's extreme fitness levels coupled with her enthusiasm and diligent answers in the interviews sealed her success as Chloe was one of the final 12 to be selected from the initial 250



young athletes competing in the trials.

Chloe begins her challenge on Sunday 22nd June when along with her 11 newly formed teammates she travels to France, staying on the coast of La Rochelle. From there they will travel by boat to the Fort to battle for keys and points each day.

Chloe said "I am really excited. Hopefully my team will win and become the ultimate conquerors of the Fort". Miss Jackson, Chloe's PE teacher said "I am delighted for Chloe. 
YEAR 6 EXPERIENCE TECHNOLOGY AT ST MARTIN'S SCHOOL
