UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE TRIP: YEARS 9-11

On Tuesday 26 April, 35 students from our Most Able register were selected to spend a day at Emmanuel College, at the University of Cambridge. It is one of the larger colleges, which has a community of around 500 undergraduate students; 150 graduate students; 90 Fellows and 150 college staff. It was founded in 1584, on the site of a Dominican priory, by Sir Walter Mildmay, Chancellor of the Exchequer to Elizabeth I. Parts of the monastic buildings remain today.

The students took part in a variety of activities such as budget planning and admissions choices, which helped them to gain an insight into life at university. They also got to tour the impressive buildings with some current university students and took a walk through Cambridge to see some of the other colleges. The day ended with a trip to the Cambridge University Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology.











live insects. They also had the opportunity to visit an area in the museum of their own choosing, the dinosaurs and the sensory exhibit were the most popular

Buddy Miller


Despite difficult situations during his younger years, Buddy has gone on to be a positive, happy, young

ENGINEERING EDUCATION SCHEME


The Technology Faculty had a successful year running the Engineering Education Scheme with four Year 12 students; Tara Burns, Alex Chamberlain, Fifeh Mustafa and Jacob Reilly. We are lucky to be sponsored by Selex ES (now called Leonardo-Finmeccanica) from Basildon, an international engineering company. They set our students a brief of designing and prototyping a remote controlled vehicle to follow a GPS route to a destination and then take a series of photographs that could be relayed back to a base station.

The student team attended the Celebration Assessment Day at PROCAT in Basildon. They presented their results in front of a team of professional engineers; this involved a written report, a presentation and then being interviewed at their display stand. They performed well and were complemented on their team work, planning and the excellent final product that they had prototyped.

I included this information within my Eton application and I believe that this has contributed to my success in being offered a place.

I feel extremely fortunate to have been given this experience. I will embrace my time at Eton and take all the help and advice on board in the hope that I will be successful in my future university applications.

In April, Year 11 GCSE drama students performed their devised performances worth 30% of their GCSE grade.






