





YEAR 10 & 12 MODERN FOREIGN LANUAGES TRIP TO BERLIN



We have over the last three years organised a languages trip to Berlin for GCSE and A Level German students and this year proved, once again, to be a packed schedule of many of Berlin's most famous sights.

After an incredibly early departure from school; the students, Mrs Ballard, Mrs Mercer and myself arrived in Berlin. We started off our trip with some fantastic 360° views of the city from the top of the Fernsehturm. After a bit of shopping and a delicious Döner lunch we made our way to our hostel to enjoy some free time, the students then took advantage of the hotel's basketball court and rooftop terrace.

On day two we gained a deeper understandingofBerlin'shistorythrough a guided walking tour, which took us from the well-known Brandenburg Gate, towards Checkpoint Charlie,

I enjoyed having the opportunity to practise my German, seeing the interesting sights of Berlin and the German History. Oluseyi Adaramola – 10Q2 the Holocaust Memorial and Hitler's bunker via the famous chocolate shop Fassbender und Rausch. We were able to enjoy some traditional German Currywurst for lunch before making our way to the concentration camp at Sachsenhausen, where we had another guided tour. The evening finished off with a visit to the Hofbräuhaus (Germany's most famous beerhall), where the students tried out some traditional Wiener Schnitzel with Kartofelsalat, entertained by live music from an Oompah band, which encouraged many of us to get up and dance along!

On day three after a traditional German breakfast, we had plenty of free time. We started off our day with a walk along the East Side Gallery, the largest remaining part of the Berlin Wall which separated East and West Berlin for 28 years. We then headed towards Potsdamer Platz for some more shopping followed by some important souvenir-buying opportunities from the famous Ampelmann shop. We then experienced more German history with a visit to the Holocaust Museum and after (another) delicious Döner lunch we then entered the Reichstag, and walked up to the dome at the top. The day was made complete by a relaxing visit to a bowling alley where we all enjoyed some light-hearted competitiveness.

Noah won the gold medal and is the London Regional Champion in the 400 metre freestyle for his age group. He



ST MARTIN'S SCHOOL WELCOMES A SURVIVOR FROM THE HOLOCAUST EDUCATIONAL TRUST



In June a number of students from St Martin's School heard testimony from Holocaust survivor, Susie Barnett as part of a visit organised by the Holocaust Educational Trust (HET).

Her testimony was followed by a question and answer session to enable students to better understand the nature of the Holocaust and to explore its lessons in more depth. The visit is part of the Holocaust Educational Trust's extensive all year round Outreach Programme, which is available to schools across the UK.

Karen Pollock MBE, Chief Executive of the Holocaust Educational Trust added:

"The Holocaust Educational Trust educates and engages students from across the UK, from all communities about the Holocaust and there can be no better way than through the firsthand testimony of a survivor. Susie Barnett's story is one of tremendous courage during horrific circumstances and by hearing her testimony, students will have the opportunity to learn where prejudice and racism can

ultimately lead.

"At the Trust, we impart the history of the Holocaust to young people, to ensure that we honour the memory of those whose lives were lost and take forward the lessons taught by those who survived."

Susie Barnett

Susie Barnett, née Frankenberg, was born in Hamburg, in Nizzi Germany. She tells the story of her family's life in pre-war Germany, how they all escaped individually, but the price they nonetheless paid as a family.

Susie's parents were Minna and Arthur Frankenberg. She was the youngest child of four. Her one brother and two sisters came to England on kindertransport, not together but separately, a frightening experience for all refugee children.

After being in a concentration camp, her father managed to reach Shanghai, China. Her mother was left on her own in Hambarg with Susie who was just a baby. A Jewish family offered to adopt Susie to make it possible for her mother to escape to England where her other three children were living in foster homes. However, she refused, fearing she would never have peace of mind again if she agreed.

Susie owes her life to the kindness of two caring people in London. She considers the way they helped her mother to escape from the horrors of Nazi Germany to be a "miracle".

Although both her parents and the four children survived they never lived together again as a family and Suele thinks that this was damaging to all of them, especially to her.

Susie's childhood was spent in foster homes and children's homes where she was all too often unhappy. She only met her father when she was nine; a difficult and bittersweet relationship developed.

In 1958 Susie became a secondary school teacher. She taught for 28 years. In 1963 the married. She has a son and daughter and four grandchildren. For the first time she understood how good family life could be. So, after many unhappy years as a child, she found true happiness in her adult life.

YEAR 12 CHEMISTRY ORGANIC PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE AT THE UNIVERSITY OF EAST ANGLIA

Our Year 12 Chemistry students enjoyed a hands on practical experience at the University of East Anglia (UEA). Working in pairs, they produced their own paracetamol and then used analytical techniques to work out the purity of the end product. The skills learnt will help them demonstrate the practical skills required for A Level.





KS3 SCIENCE EXPERIMENTS

In science we use practicals to help secure content learnt during lessons. It is also an ideal opportunity to learn practical skills which students will need for their required practicals at GCSE.

In Year 9 students learn how to test foods for the presences of proteins, fats, sugars and starch. This is a photograph showing the testing for the presence of protein using Benedict's solution on marshmallow, potato and cheese. The cheese solution has gone purple to indicate protein is present. Students also learn about the movement of substances through osmosis and diffusion. To test this the students placed a gummy bear in different



concentrations of sugar solutions to observe the movement of water into the gummy bears. This photo shows the comparison between a gummy bear left in water next to a normal sized gummy bear. The water moved into the bear making it increase in size. Students measured the sizes of the gummer bears in different concentrations and used the data to predict the sizes of gummy bears in other concentrations. They are then able to draw a graph of their results.



Year 8 students get a chance to create a model of a plant cell. The photograph shows the models made recently by Year 8s which are currently on display in a lab in the science department. The students could use whatever materials they wanted to. The ones in the picture are made from Lego, clay, Hama beads and an old tissue box. They are then given an opportunity to develop their models by adding descriptions of the structures within the cell.



In Year 7 we build up the level of practicals from when the students join up to the end of Year 7. We teach the students how to use equipment safely and how to use the data they collect. The photograph shows a practical completed by Year 7 students near the end of the year. They create their own indicator then use it to test different substances to identify if they are acids or alkalis and their strength. The students then move on to understanding how they can neutralise the substances.

Year 12 Chemistry students attended a session looking at Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) and other analytical techniques. It was a great opportunity for the students to experience equipment that is only available in university chemistry departments, some of which was worth over a million pounds. The day ended with a fascinating lecture about the chemistry of water.
